In 1982, a group of business leaders, community activists, and teachers in Petaluma convened to develop funding solutions for area schools in response to major budget deficits throughout the California school system. The outcome was the creation of the Petaluma Educational Foundation (PEF), a privately funded, non-profit organization whose primary goal is to raise money in the community to benefit education. As of the end of the 2021-2022 academic year, thanks to the generosity and vision of our supporters, PEF has awarded a cumulative total of \$8,412,704 to students and schools in the Petaluma area through PEF Impact Grants and PEF Scholarships since the programs were first launched!

PEF receives no state or government funding. The Foundation raises funds from individuals, corporations, organizations and foundations. In addition, PEF manages Alphabet Soup Benefit Thrift Stores which support the mission of PEF. PEF is designated by the Internal Revenue Service as a tax-exempt, non-profit, charitable 501(c)(3) organization. Our tax ID is #94-2847212.

PEF's History

PEF serves 36 TK-12 schools in the Petaluma area. More than 12,000 students benefit annually from PEF grants and scholarships.

\$4,315,995 in PEF Scholarships awarded to graduating seniors since 1990. This year we awarded our highest amount since the program started, providing **\$262,826** to members of the Class of 2022.

\$4,096,709 in PEF Grants awarded since 1982. In 2021-2022 we granted a total of **\$198,070** with a special focus on:

LITERACY & LANGUAGE ARTS

2021-2022 PEF GRANTS: \$198,070

PUTTING LEVELED READERS IN ALL STUDENTS' HANDS - \$10,000 Funding partner: Community Foundation Sonoma County/Sonoma County Vintners Fund

By building a leveled reader library, teachers can take students through each step necessary to reach complete literacy. This will increase the school's capacity to provide appropriate materials for the varied levels of readers across our campus. The funding from this grant purchased shared leveled-reading libraries with packs of six or eight

books at each level of support in-class and intervention reading groups as well as providing books that students take home for practice. These books are available to TK to 6th grade students with the focus on high-interest titles and topics to encourage even more excitment for reading. The choice of titles ranges from nonfiction to fiction, biography, history, graphic novels, and Spanish language titles as well. Teachers understand that complete literacy for our native Spanish speakers means reading in Spanish to build confidence as they transfer to English literacy. This partnership is creating opportunities for all students



on campus to achieve their academic goals while developing a love of reading. Students directly impacted: 189 students (100% of the student body) in TK- 6th grades at Valley Vista Elementary School

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING

ENGAGING STUDENTS IN ALL WAYS - \$15,000

Funding partner: The Larry Hillblom Foundation

Through the introduction of increased musical opportunities, mindfulness practices and movement/social outlets, this grant provides critical support for social/emotional and physical growth to create an engaged student population. Latin American percussion instruments and online music programs, mindfulness training and bilingual anti-bullying literacy, along with other structured activities will cultivate personal and multilingual development. Students will learn social/emotional regulation, appropriate peer collaboration and body awareness through the school's dual immersion lens. By equipping educators with the resources needed to address a multitude of diverse needs, this program will assist teachers in supporting the whole child to produce multicultural and socially capable students who meaningfully engage within their school and the larger world.

Students directly impacted: 485 students (100% of the student body) in TK-6th grades at Loma Vista Immersion Academy

OUTDOOR LEARNING SPACES - \$14,859

Funding partner: Exchange Bank

This grant supports student development across multiple domains through the creation of two quality outdoor learning spaces that build upon child creativity and individual skill sets as well as breed greater cooperation and teamwork. Simultaneously functioning as both workshops and laboratories, these new learning spaces permit students to move beyond the restrictions of indoor education and actively explore their natural world through project-based learning. This program strengthens the current "Buddies Program" by increasing opportunities for collaboration and will allow teachers to intentionally construct shared, multi-use spaces for the vertical integration of curriculum across all grade levels.

ENGAGING STUDENTS IN ALL WAYS IN COVID TIMES - \$15,000

Funding partner: Andrea & John Barella

With a goal to improve the social emotional well-being and educational success of all students, this grant provides the school with the specialized equipment required for the construction of a "sensory gym." Diverse sensory opportunities will support students with varied sensory profiles by addressing their needs in order to develop advanced language and critical thinking abilities while decreasing anxiety and challenging behaviors. Future program expansion into each classroom will equip teachers with the tools to successfully integrate sensory curriculum into daily practice and to support healthy self-regulation and overall student achievement.

HEALTH & NUTRITION

SHOT PUT ARENA - \$4,000

Funding partner: Fund the Future Donors

The Kenilworth Junior High School campus will now include a designated shot put area in an effort to improve the overall track and field experience for current and future athletes. In providing the athletic department with the materials required to construct a more reliable space, this program will yield personal athletic improvement by allowing students to regularly practice and visually track their progress. A professional looking space will drive enthusiasm surrounding the sport while increasing shot put participation amongst the remainder of the student body as opportunities for use will ultimately be extended to the Physical Education department.

Students directly impacted: 150 students in 7th-8th grades at Kenilworth Junior High School

ROOM TO GROW: AN OUTDOOR GARDEN CLASSROOM \$15,000 Funding partner: Wayne & Roberta Musser Foundation and Fund the Future Donors

This grant addresses the need to provide students with Montessori-based outdoor learning opportunities by creating an avenue for hands-on experiences across botany, biology and environmental studies. Through the construction of an outdoor garden classroom, students of all ages actively participate in their education by learning how to draw hypotheses, conduct their own research, analyze results and draw conclusions about their environment.

By permitting students to engage with the natural world, this program will breed well rounded scientists whose thirst for knowledge will drive critical thinking and collaborative skill development as they work together to apply new academic concepts in their garden adventures.

In an effort to support student learning as well as their physical and social development, this grant will provide opportunities for education and movement through the construction of an Imagination Playground. In the absence of a play structure, new foam block sets assist in nourishing healthy intellectual and social/emotional growth for all students by cultivating problem solving skills and student creativity for years to come. Access to STEAMcentered manipulatives allow students to engage in meaningful hands-on learning that utilizes play to transform their individual academic experiences.

Students directly impacted: 225 students (100% of the student body) in TK-8th grades at Cinnabar School

UNRULY SPLATS: CODING & PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM - \$10.945

Funding partner: Petaluma Health Care District

This grant will assist teachers in supporting the physical, intellectual and social/emotional development of all students by providing access to a cross-curricular, STEM-based learning tool. The Unruly Splats app will allow students to code their own games and be collectively played on physical SPLAT pads in a manner that will foster individual self-regulation and responsible decision making as well as cooperative partnerships. As students learn to become active participants in their education, this program will breed significant educational experiences by cultivating computer capabilities within the framework of physical education and positive social/emotional growth.

Students directly impacted: 515 students (100% of the student body) in TK-8th grades at McKinley Elementary School & Petaluma Accelerated Charter School

BRING ON THE CODE - \$9,923

Funding partner: County of Sonoma - Board of Supervisors and Fund the Future Donors

The goal of this grant is to provide 2nd-6th grade classes with the Lego Mindstorm robot inventor kits and Dash Bots required for teachers to create and implement a quality coding and robotics program. By supplying students with the educational tools to become proficient with real-world coding and robotics, this grant will increase student engagement and performance through opportunities for rigorous hands-on learning and student-centered curriculum. Early access to coding and robotics practice in the younger years will produce effective communicators and critical thinkers who are prepared to succeed as prospective participants in the PCS Robotics competition and in this field throughout high school, college and beyond.

Students directly impacted: 146 students (100% of the student body) in 2nd-6th grades at McDowell Elementary School

PROJECT STUDENT INTERVENTION - \$10,934

Funding partner: Clover Sonoma

With a goal to support the overall achievement of the entire student population, this grant will supply teachers with the technology required to bridge the academic and social learning gaps created by distant education. New Chromebooks will assist in individualizing learning experiences for students by providing educators with access to the online curriculum and equipment vital to addressing a range of academic needs. By transforming St. Vincent Elementary into a 1:1 device school, this program will maximize educational and professional growth as students can learn at their own pace and teachers can utilize online modules for small group instruction or one-on-one assistance.

Students directly impacted: 180 students (100% of the student body) in K-8th grades at St. Vincent de Paul Elementary

COOPERATIVE STEAM PLAYGROUND \$13,268

Funding partner: Kristi & Ron Fedrick and Fund the Future Donors

In providing teachers with the academic tools to construct an engaging environment, this grant will support student growth across various developmental domains. By supplying students with Imagination Playground blocks, this program will establish a STEAM-centered



play space to yield meaningful play opportunities that nourish curiosity, problem solving, and mathematical/engineering skills while simultaneously fostering collaboration and social/emotional improvement. In the proposed Block Festival, students, families and teachers will engage collectively in block-based challenges to encourage critical thinking and active learning through shared inquiry and hands-on experiences.

BROADCAST FIELD EQUIPMENT UPGRADE \$12,740

> Funding partner: Christensen Family Foundation

This grant provides Petaluma High School with state-of-the-industry field technologies required to enhance the current Broadcast Journalism program and ensure continued compliance with relevant California Technical Education Anchor Standards. This project introduces upgraded cameras and live stream equipment to assist students in becoming technologically competent "content creators" by allowing them to experiment with various aspects of broadcasting, such as script writing, interviewing, editing and developing collaborative capabilities. In learning how to independently navigate industry demands from prethrough post-production, students will build a strong foundation for success in the broadcasting field and

related careers.

GREEN TRACKS - \$14,614

Funding partner: Anne & Dante Benedetti and Sally & Ned Foley and Carol Ann & Dan Libarle

In an effort to reduce the school's ecological footprint, this grant will assist in transforming Wilson School into an entirely digital environment while simultaneously offering more opportunities for experimentation with STEM disciplines. New Chromebooks will convert the campus into a 1:1 device school for 4th-6th grade, offering online learning programs that will decrease the need for paper handouts, while a centralized data server will yield the seamless transfer of information and reduce unnecessary prints. By providing access to a 3-Dimensional printer, this program will establish a fresh avenue for STEM-based learning through which students can explore the world of architecture as well as their own work brought to life via 3-D design and modeling. **Students directly impacted: 218 students (100% of the student body) in K-6th grades at Wilson School School**

MINI-TRICASTER FOR MAJOR MEDIA PRODUCTION - \$9,400

Funding partner: Andrea & John Barella

This grant will focus on supporting the KTV Broadcast Media program in nurturing the academic and social/emotional learning of all students by equipping them with the tools needed to produce a studio-quality news show. In utilizing an upgraded TriCaster, a key piece of their equipment, students will improve their broadcast media experience by learning to collectively perform various technological duties alongside collaborative script writing, graphics creation and video production. Increased technological reliability, storage and portability will afford students opportunities to work efficiently and professionally in both the studio and community to adequately prepare themselves for internships in broadcast media. **Students directly impacted: 64 students in 7th-8th grades at Kenilworth Junior High School**

LIBRARY & TECHNOLOGY LAB RESOURCE INITIATIVE - \$14,569 Funding partner: Fund the Future Donors

This grant will support Harvest Christian in expanding their current technological base to address the school community's educational needs through the implementation of Apple iMac computers. By providing a greater number of digital resources, this program offers students more opportunities for independent learning and collaborative partnerships through web-based research, typing classes, math programs and in the creation of carefully crafted digital presentations. Increased device availability will allow educators to embrace technology within daily lesson planning and curricular activities and will cultivate greater familiarity with and the successful operation of digital equipment inside the classroom.

FINE ARTS

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL HIGH SCHOOL VISUAL ART PROGRAM - \$12,060 Funding partner: Petaluma Market

This grant will equip St. Vincent High School's Visual Art Program with updated pottery kilns to enhance the current ceramics program and offer students greater opportunities to expand their knowledge within the world of art and art documentation. Providing students with modern ceramic technologies will enrich their education as individual and collaborative hands-on learning generates valuable sensory experiences which boost self-esteem and self-acceptance. By allowing students to expand upon their pottery skills, this program will yield vocationally orientated individuals who are prepared to successfully pursue careers within the 3D Arts field.
