In the first 60 days of the global pandemic, PEF, our superintendents, and principals covened to identify the immediate needs to support local students and schools during this very challenging time. We immediately adapted our 2020-2021 grant program to address the two most commonly shared focus areas of all districts: *Social-Emotional Learning (SEL)* and *Technology (access and devices).* 

With awards up to \$5,000 per grant for these focus areas, we provided support earlier in the year and increased the number of grants selected for funding. We also added a second application round for all schools as distance-learning continued longer than initially anticipated. This is reflected in higher award amounts in some summaries. These changes offered targeted support to teachers and students as they navigated distance learning, on-campus instruction, and a hybrid of the two formats as the academic year progressed.

HOW WE ADAPTED TO SUPPORT OUR SCHOOLS DURING COVID

Thank you for supporting us as we worked to provide our schools and students with the tools needed to learn during this unprecedented time.

For the 2021-2022 academic year, PEF will return to our traditional model of supporting all academic focus areas with impact grant awards of up to \$15,000 per program.

As stewards of your gift, PEF believes it is our responsibility to observe and evaluate each awarded grant. We work with our school partners to ensure the grants are implemented as described in the application and record the outcomes to demonstrate the ongoing impact. We look forward to visiting campuses in person this upcoming school year to speak with teachers and hear directly from students about how PEF's support continues to create opportunities to enhance their learning experience.



# WHO WE ARE

## **PEF's History**

In 1982, a group of business leaders, community activists, and teachers in Petaluma convened to develop funding solutions for area schools in response to major budget deficits throughout the California school system. The outcome was the creation of the Petaluma Educational Foundation (PEF), a privately funded, nonprofit organization whose primary goal is to raise money in the community to benefit education. As of the end of the 2020-2021 academic year, thanks to the generosity and vision of our supporters, PEF has awarded a cumulative total of \$7,951,808 to students and schools in the Petaluma area through PEF Impact Grants and PEF Scholarships since the programs were first launched!

PEF receives no state or government funding. The Foundation raises funds from individuals, corporations, organizations and foundations. In addition, PEF manages Alphabet Soup Benefit Thrift Stores which support the mission of PEF. PEF is designated by the Internal Revenue Service as a tax-exempt, non-profit, charitable 501(c)(3) organization. Our tax ID is #94-2847212.

# **Did You Know?**

PEF serves 38 TK-12 schools in the Petaluma area. More than 12,000 students benefit annually from PEF grants and scholarships.

\$4,053,169 in PEF Scholarships awarded to graduating seniors since 1990. This year we awarded our second-highest amount since the program started, providing \$238,659 to members of the Class of 2021.

\$3,898,639 in PEF Grants awarded since 1982. In 2020-2021 we granted a total of \$132,453 with a special focus on Social-Emotional Learning and Technology. Traditional areas of focus for PEF Impact Grants include:

# SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL)

#### DEVELOPING STUDENT AGENCY AND VOICE THROUGH SEL - \$5,000 Funding partner: Petaluma Health Care District

#### CHANGING PERSPECTIVES \$5,000

Funding partner: Susan & Nicholas Philbin Through this grant, teachers at Grant Elementary have direct access to a social-emotional curriculum that is easily adaptable to the unique needs of different classrooms. Changing Perspectives provides lessons presented by classroom teachers to address the current struggles of elementaryaged students. The program goal is to nurture a foundation of skillsets to develop inclusivity and empathy in students that they will take with them beyond their elementary school experience.

Students directly impacted: 370 students (100% of the student body) in K-6th grades at Grant Elementary School This grant supports educators in adequately nurturing the social emotional learning (SEL) of all students by equipping teachers with the appropriate tools needed to become SEL ambassadors. By integrating cultural and linguistically relevant SEL curriculum, teachers are able to support overall student social emotional wellbeing, agency and voice in a manner that cultivates SEL themes, such as empathy, positive relationships and problem solving. Educator workshops and virtual training continue to assist teachers by providing strategies for the successful integration of SEL mentor text with the regular CORE curriculum at the appropriate grade level. **Students directly impacted: 243 students (100% of the student body) in TK-6th grades at McDowell Elementary School** 

#### CHARACTER STRONG: SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING & CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT IN ONE PJHS \$4,500, KJHS \$4,500 & MCKINLEY \$5,000

#### Funding partner: Community Foundation Sonoma County

This grant offers relevant, interactive curriculum and resources required to address the social and emotional needs of all students in a manner that aligns with multiple learning styles, diverse classroom needs and Common Core Standards. Combining virtual content with activity-based learning, this program supplies teachers with lesson plans and activities that will cultivate whole child evolution in both SEL and character growth areas, such as self awareness, relationship building, forgiveness and commitment, as well as offer educators accessibility to professional development webinars. Increased opportunities for deeper connections to develop amongst students and teachers result in well-rounded students, a positive learning atmosphere and a strong sense of community. **Students directly impacted: 527 students in TK-8th grades at McKinley Elementary School, 500 students in 7th-8th grades at Petaluma Junior High, and 847 students in 7th-8th grades at Kenilworth Junior High (100% of the student body at all three campuses)** 

#### BUILDING A SCHOOL-WIDE GROWTH MINDSET - \$3,500 Funding partners: Fund the Future Donors

Fostering a "growth mindset" in which students, families and teachers develop resiliency and an ability to adapt to an ever-changing world with openness and confidence is the ultimate goal of this program. In addition to the professional development courses and the tools, strategies and activities afforded to teachers surrounding the adoption of a "growth mindset," this grant provides a schoolwide resilience-centered library that includes age-appropriate books for students, parents and educators. Furthermore, parents have the opportunity to participate in "Parent University" sessions geared toward building a "growth mindset" and sharing resiliency techniques amongst families. **Students directly impacted: 155 students** (100% of the student body) in K-6th grades at River Montessori Charter School **RESILIENCE EMBRACED - \$5,000** 

#### Funding partner: County of Sonoma - Board of Supervisors

With a goal to support the overall social emotional well-being of the entire student population, this grant will provide teachers with Toolbox Curriculum as well as the professional training required to successfully integrate such curriculum into daily practice. This program will allow educators to access a social emotional curriculum portal and select a variety of Common Core aligned lesson plans, book units, video discussions, activities and other classroom supplies that can be altered to suit the diverse needs of all students, either remotely or in-person. Virtual consultation and workshops will ensure teachers accurately implement the curriculum in a manner that promotes student personal growth and skill development while nurturing resiliency in the face of challenge. **Students directly impacted: 409 students (100% of the student body) in K-8th grades at Mary Collins Charter School at Cherry Valley** 

# SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL)

# MEETING OUR STUDENTS WHERE THEY ARE: SOCIAL EMOTIONAL SUPPORT FOR ALL - \$5,000

#### **Funding partners: Fund the Future Donors**

Through the introduction of social emotional centered activities coupled with Kimochi dolls and their accompanying curriculum, this grant will provide students with numerous opportunities for optimal learning and school connection. By equipping educators with the resources needed to support higher quality social emotional education, this program will cultivate student development of a resilient mind, collaboration skills and the confidence to interact meaningfully in the personal, educational and professional spheres of their larger world. Classroom libraries will receive social emotional literacy materials intended to assist students in learning how to comprehend and regulate their emotions as well as work through any potential conflict. **Students directly impacted: 475 students (100% of the student body) in TK-6th grades at Penngrove Elementary School** 

# SUPPORTING HEAD, HEART & HANDS THROUGH TECHNOLOGY \$9,978

# Funding partners: Soiland Co./Christina & Mark Soiland & Fund the Future Donors

Providing faculty with the technological resources required to adequately support students during distance learning while continuing to honor the holistic and no/low-tech approach of Waldorf-inspired education is this program's goal. From webcams and document cameras to external monitors and virtual bulletin boards, from communication platforms and classroom apps to a Macbook adapter, this grant will permit the acquisition of software and hardware critical to maintaining Waldorf pedagogy in an online learning model. Such technology will increase student connections to materials in the physical classroom as well as peers and teachers in virtual communities. A second grant improves the online educational experience of both students and teachers by providing the campus with a new internet infrastructure that will adequately support remote learning. By replacing the present mixture of DSL internet, hotspots and weak wireless connections, this program will offer reliable high speed internet between the office building and every classroom, creating an equitable, accessible campus for all.

Students directly impacted: 290 students (100% of the student body) in K-8th grades at Live Oak Charter School

#### SENSORY WALKS & PATHS TO CALM THE MIND & BODY - \$3,683

#### Funding partners: Sally & Ned Foley

This grant will support the establishment of stenciled or stickered Sensory Walks/Paths around campus with the intention of calming active minds and bodies by providing opportunities for students to jump, balance, hop or tiptoe. By encouraging them to listen to their bodies and minds, this program will assist students in learning how to socially and emotionally regulate themselves through specific body movements in a manner that cultivates smooth transitions between physical activity and focused learning. As students determine how to re-center and refocus themselves, such strategies can be applied to various situations throughout their lives, resulting in calm regulated learners who become productive members of society. **Students directly impacted: 223 students (100% of the student body) in TK-6th grades at Valley Vista Elementary School**

# **TECHNOLOGY: ACCESS AND DEVICES**

#### **PROJECT COMMUNITY CONNECT - \$9,145**

#### **Funding partner: Clover Sonoma**

This grant will support student academic and social development by providing students and teachers with the technological tools needed to successfully navigate a distance learning/hybrid/in-person model of instruction. iPads, stylus pens and tripods will provide students with opportunities for differentiated learning and collaborative work as well as improved access to curriculum and social emotional support. Additionally, this program will strengthen the school's overall wireless infrastructure to ensure successful technological operation through the improved quantity and quality of live streamed curriculum when needed. **Students directly impacted: 158 students (100% of the student body) in K-8th grades at St. Vincent Elementary School** 

## **ELEMENTARY & MIDDLE SCHOOL TECHNOLOGY EQUIPMENT - \$7,410**

#### Funding partners: Fund the Future Donors

This grant will equip the elementary and middle school students with vital Chromebooks that will ensure the achievement of the school's educational goals and an equal academic experience for all. As families in need are provided with the appropriate technology, opportunities will emerge for all students to continue to improve navigation of online platforms as well as readiness for future secondary and collegiate studies. **Students directly impacted: 35 students in TK-8th grades at Harvest Christian School** 

#### TECH FOR TEACHING AND LEARNING IN TRYING TIMES - \$5,000 Funding partners: Fund the Future Donors

In an effort to secure equity for all students, improve the performance of current learning

tools and cultivate adaptation to new academic platforms, this grant will provide students with higher quality educational experiences by reducing resource gaps. While this program will specifically target the school's most vulnerable, such as English Learners and at-risk individuals, all students will benefit from increased efforts made to level the academic playing field. New keyboards, headphones, and iPad styluses and stands will allow a diverse range of student needs to be addressed across every classroom to ensure high quality learning and instruction for all. **Students directly** 



impacted: 347 students (100% of the student body) in TK-8th grades at McNear Elementary School

# MAKING A DIFFERENCE! USING TECHNOLOGY TO SUPPORT DISTANCE LEARNING - \$4,259

#### Funding partner: Petaluma Market

The goal of this grant is to improve the educational experience of the student body by creating rich learning opportunities intended to produce positive academic outcomes. By providing high-quality headphones equipped with microphones, this program will permit students to become more engaged in their academics by ensuring they can understand their teachers during live/synchronous learning times and vice versa. These headsets will assist in eliminating distractions allowing the students to focus more, listen to instructions, and participate in educational discussions. **Students directly impacted: 200 students in TK-6th grades at Miwok Valley Elementary** 

#### COMPUTER MICE FOR DIGITAL PROJECTS & MEDIA PRODUCTION \$604 Funding partners: Fund the Future Donors

This grant will provide students with the computer mice needed to produce the fine, detailed edits that yield higher-quality digital projects, graphics and film production in their Design Lab and Broadcast Media classes. This program will allow students to remotely access opportunities to cultivate their computer skills in a manner that closely mirrors their physical classroom experience. **Students directly impacted: 192 students in 7th-8th grades at Kenilworth Junior High School** 

#### DISTANCE LEARNING TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM \$10,000 Funding partner: Larry Hillblom Foundation

**PEF GRANTS:** 

This grant will provide students and teachers with the technological equipment required for both parties to achieve success. This program introduces mobile Smart TV monitors with webcams as well as the corresponding hardware to the classroom environment that will improve the overall teaching capabilities of educators and the learning experience of students. Such upgraded campus resources yield student accessibility to synchronistic instruction and more opportunities for students and teachers to have their needs met.

# **TECHNOLOGY: ACCESS AND DEVICES**

#### **MYSTERY SCIENCE EXPLORATION FOR ALL - \$10,000**

#### Funding partners: The Alfred & Hanna Fromm Fund & Fund the Future Donors

This grant addresses the need to provide students with meaningful scientific educational opportunities rooted in Common Core Standards that offer interactive experiences. By facilitating simultaneous student access to the intriguing digital format of Mystery Science's online curriculum alongside tangible materials, such as science kits filled with lessons and experiments, this program offers vital hands-on experiences (whether distance learning or in-person instruction) to cultivate improved scientific comprehension. Through the provision of necessary academic tools to all, students will engage with their peers, teachers and the curriculum in a manner that stimulates curiosity and increased confidence in scientific knowledge. **Students directly impacted: 684 students (100% of the student body) in TK-6th grades at Meadow Elementary School and Corona Creek Elementary School** 

#### BLENDED LEARNING - \$5,000

#### Funding partner: Bank of Marin

This grant supports academic achievement by providing students with the Chromebooks needed to successfully manage a distance learning or in-person instruction model. Given that not all students possess a desktop, tablet or Chromebook at home, this program will assist in

moving Wilson Elementary toward becoming a 1:1 device school, ensuring that all students have access to the same equipment required to yield smooth curriculum connection and stable classroom operation. Upon the school's transition to a hybrid model of learning, the increased quantity of Chromebooks reduced the need for sharing, allow students to transport their devices between school and home and ultimately play a critical role in their academic success.

Students directly impacted: 22 students in TK- 6th grades at Wilson Elementary School



# HELPING STUDENTS PARTICIPATE WITH SOUND! - \$5,000

#### Funding partner: Exchange Bank

This grant will focus on increasing student academic participation, access to learning and individualized education plans through the provision of high-quality headphones with a built-in microphone. Whether in a remote, hybrid, or in-person learning, students will be able to utilize these headphones to minimize distractions and background noise, increase focus, capitalize on opportunities for differentiated learning and actively engage with their classmates and teachers. This program will provide students with the resources needed to clearly listen to lessons and meaningfully respond through voice recordings/videos, allowing their voices to be heard in a manner that decreases student frustration and cultivates a positive perspective about school. **Students directly impacted: 478 students (100% of the student body) in TK- 6th grades at Loma Vista Immersion Academy** 

#### IPAD STANDS FOR DISTANCE LEARNING - \$3,333

#### Funding partner: The Wayne & Roberta Musser Foundation

The goal of this grant is to provide TK, kindergarten and first grade classes with the adjustable iPad stands required for teachers to observe and comment on the quality of student work while in progress during Zoom synchronous instruction. By supplying students with the appropriate resources to alter the angle of their cameras for desktop viewing, this program offers teachers a more stable glimpse of student progress and the opportunity to provide encouragement or correction as students are completing their assignments. Such immediate feedback will help boost student engagement and provide teachers with the opportunity to prevent future learning complications by addressing issues as they arise in real-time. **Students directly impacted: 108 students in TK, K and 1st grades at Old Adobe Charter School** 

#### **BROADCAST JOURNALISM TECH UPGRADE - \$9,424**

#### **Funding partner: Christensen Family Foundation**

The primary goal is to enable the Trojan Broadcast Channel to be compliant with California Technical Education standards to ensure CTE certification for students in the Broadcast Journalism program. The grant will purchase new cameras, new lenses, and a new light in order to provide equipment which is standard in modern broadcasting studios. **Students directly impacted: 32 students in 9th-12th grades at Petaluma High School**

By providing students with the technological tools they require to effectively produce these videos, this program will nurture student organizational, communication and performance abilities as they learn to use multimedia equipment and assume the role of interviewer or news anchor. This program will help create a sense of community amongst students and teachers by broadcasting to all what is happening on campus, including news, class highlights, school-wide activities and public service announcements.
